n April 8, a total solar eclipse will cross North America, passing over Mexico, the United States, and Canada. The path of "totality" (when the moon completely blocks out the sun) will travel directly across the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex, making The University of Texas at Arlington an ideal place for the public to witness a phenomenon that only happens about every 400 years.

The partial eclipse will start at 12:23 p.m. and end at 3:02 p.m., with the totality starting at 1:40 p.m. and ending at 1:44 p.m. In the days leading up to the event, UTA and its Planetarium will hold a number of fun and informative events open to the public.

These will culminate on April 8 with UTA's Solar-bration. The event will take place from 12-3 p.m. at five primary viewing locations on the UTA campus: Brazos Park, the University Center Mall, Planetarium Mall, Spaniolo Drive/College Park Center, and the Library Mall. Each spot will have eclipse glasses available and feature audio from experts about what you are seeing as the eclipse passes over. The Solar-bration is free, though parking for visitors costs \$10. 



BLAZE FORWARD CHANGES LIVES

UTA Program Provides Free Tuition for Thousands of Students

The cost of attending college has increased dramatically over the last several decades. Between 1980 and 2020, the average price of tuition, fees, and room and board for an undergraduate degree increased 169%, according to a recent report from the Georgetown University Center on Education and the Workforce.

To help lessen the burden for students and their families, UTA launched Blaze Forward, an initiative that provides free tuition to students who come from households with an adjusted gross income of up to \$85,000. "UTA really does the most to provide for their students," says Jennifer Esmeralda Sandoval, a business management major. "It's such a great opportunity to help so many students further their education."





A design/build class in the UTA College of Architecture, Planning, and Public Affairs is collaborating with the Housing Channel of Fort Worth, the city of Arlington, and MKG Homes to build four houses in east Arlington that will be available for lease to seniors. They will be part of a master plan that includes a dozen homes in the Wynn Terrace Senior Cottage Community.

Older residents are particularly affected by the growing affordable housing crisis. According to the Texas Affiliation of Affordable Housing Providers, the median income for Texas seniors on a fixed income is \$25,601. A renter must earn \$46,889 annually to afford the current fair market rent of \$1,172 for a two-bedroom apartment.

"With a majority of their fixed income spent on increasing rent prices, seniors are now 'aging into poverty,' living one crisis away from eviction and homelessness due to lack of affordable housing options," notes Donna VanNess, president of the Housing Channel.

The new "micro-community" will have a dozen one-bedroom homes under 600 square feet, with half reserved at below-market rental prices for seniors who meet lower-income guidelines. The new homes are expected to be available for rent by summer.

LOCAL OUTREACH

High School Students Learn About Nursing Careers

Last November, students from Brewer High School, Martin High School, North Dallas High School, Keller Collegiate Academy, and Birdville Center of Technology and Advanced Learning took part in the first ever Maverick Allied Health Experience (MAH-X), hosted by the College of Nursing and Health Innovation (CONHI).

The event was designed to provide high-schoolers with information about career paths in nursing, physical therapy, sports medicine, and public health. Attendees spent the day hearing from Texas Health physicians, UTA faculty, and current nursing students and received a firsthand look at some of the cutting-edge technology they would interact with as students at UTA's Smart Hospital.



"It's our hope that MAH-X participants gained a better understanding of available health care career opportunities and the motivation to begin their academic journeys in nursing and allied health with excitement and enthusiasm," says Candice Calhoun-Butts, CONHI assistant dean.

CALLING ALL GARDENERS



The UTA organic Community Garden, a collaborative effort with the city of Arlington, provides a public green space for families, community members, and garden enthusiasts. Up to 78 plots are available for adoption in the half-acre space. Community members must commit to donating at least half of their produce to Mission Arlington, the garden's designated food bank program, as part of the \$35 annual plot use agreement. UT Arlington recently renewed its
College Work Experience Program
(CWEP) partnership with Lockheed
Martin, allocating \$5.2 million for
eligible students to gain real-world
employment skills at Lockheed Martin
Missiles and Fire Control in Grand
Prairie. This unique program is only the
second of its kind nationally between
Lockheed Martin and a university.

Dylan Bryce, a UT Arlington graduate in software engineering, says CWEP allowed him to gain valuable experience in his career field while earning his degree.

"CWEP is a fast track to an amazing career at one of the best companies to work for in the world," he says. "The leadership at Lockheed Martin is great at working with CWEP students."

For Phillips, returning to UTA was a full-circle moment.


"Anytime I teach, it reinvigorates my passion for what I do, and that passion is what I want to convey to the students," he says.

THE SCIENCE OF BEER

Brewing and Fermentation Science Certificate Program Launches



When Dylan Parks, head of UTA's new Brewing and Fermentation
Science Certificate program, tells people he used to be a beer scientist, they usually get the wrong idea.

"They're usually like, 'Oh, that's cool. You get to drink beer every day,'" says Dr. Parks. "Well, sure, but you have to drink it throughout the process, even before it's fermented. Then, it's just sugar water that doesn't taste very good."

Now, you can learn about the process up close in a new certificate program offered



at UTA—and you don't even have to be enrolled as a student. Upon completion of four required courses, participants will have gained foundational knowledge about the science of fermentation and brewing and accrued practical experience in a brew lab. In addition to course work, the certificate requires a 16-hour internship at a local fermentation or brewing facility.

Parks is excited about the possibilities for

UTA students and the University as a whole.

"UTA is a hub for Dallas-Fort Worth, and this whole area is growing with microbreweries and craft breweries. They're popping up everywhere," he says. "If we can produce students who are well-qualified for this kind of exacting science, not only will we be putting our graduates in the workforce, but building up our reputation as well."

PARDON OUR PROGRESS

CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS UNDERWAY ON CAMPUS

COOPER STREET BRIDGES

The Cooper Street Bridge renovation project is updating and improving the safety and longevity of the north and south pedestrian bridges that span Cooper Street. The South Bridge will remain closed through early May. During this time, Cooper St. will have nightly vehicle lane closures from 9 p.m. to 6 a.m.

GREEK LIFE CENTER

Fraternity and Sorority Life has begun construction and expansion of the new Greek Life Center, located at the corner of Davis Dr. and Greek Row. The facility will be a social community center for Greek Life to engage with each other, alumni, and the community. It is forecast to open in August of this year.

LIFE SCIENCE BUILDING

The University recently began work on a multi-year remodel of the Life Science building to provide space for research labs, teaching labs, classrooms, and student engagement. The refurbishment will also address deferred maintenance and upgrades to the mechanical, electrical, plumbing, and life safety systems. It should be complete by fall 2027.

MAVERICK HALL

Construction for Maverick Hall, a new residence for students, began this spring on the west side of campus. It is scheduled to open in summer 2025.
