I really focus on, my focus is on teaching.

But I have done some research in my master's degree here at UTA

for my MSSW and then also for my Ph.D.

And that research was based

on LGBTQ plus folks.

My master's degree was I did a thesis

and I did a qualitative study about the relationship between lesbians, people

who identified as lesbians at the time and gay men in leadership positions in the Dallas area.

And so then when I went and decided to get my Ph.D.,

I studied women who were assigned female at birth.

Their smoke.

I, I decided to study smoking in that population.

LGBTQ folks who identify as lesbian

and LGBTQ folks tend

to smoke more at higher rates than other groups.

And that was really intriguing to me.

And, you know, it's political, but

it's also personal and it's important.

You know you have to do the speech.

You know, it's your big speech for the first time.

And in seventh grade, my topic was about

And I think as social workers, we're drawn

It's just who we are as a general rule.

You know, I had to ask

I know everybody has their story of what led them the social work.

So it's always interesting.

The other reason was I didn't have to take algebra.

So can you tell us a little bit

Wow. That's a big question because, you know, I think it changes all the time.

And I think it depends on where you live, honestly.

And I did a little research digging into some of the literature about it.

And so,

you know, I think people

we faced, when I came out a long time ago, it was very different.

And it was,

of course, prior to the Supreme Court ruling in 2015.

And I think today's struggles are very different.

There's still struggles and

they're different.

One thing I think that we don't do a good job of

is having young people understand our history

and understand the, you know, the fight and the struggle

and all of the things that led up to where we are today.

And I really think it's important that we understand our history.

Okay with that,

how do you think we should go about that?

Because I know there are like in I believe there are classes here.

And, you know, I've never heard of anybody taking them.

We actually have an LGBTQ Plus studies class,

and it is open to anyone who is at the university.

De'An:

It's not specific to social work,

00:06:57:23 - 00:07:02:23

De'An:

and I've taught it a few times and actually we only have two or three social workers in there.

De'An:

Usually, it's a diverse group of students and that makes me so happy

00:07:09:05 - 00:07:12:01

De'An:

that we have all kinds of majors of students

00:07:12:01 - 00:07:16:18

De'An:

who are interested in LGBTQ studies and the historical perspective.

De'An:

Some of them identify as part of the community and some of them don't.

00:07:20:13 - 00:07:25:01

De'An:

And they say, I just take this class because I want to learn more and be a part of the community,

00:07:25:01 - 00:07:28:01

De'An:

of the larger community, and learn more about,

00:07:28:01 - 00:07:31:04

De'An:

you know, they have friends or their family and that kind of thing.

Jaelon:

I always think that's the best thing ever.

Jaelon:

Just, you know, being a part and just wanting to be involved

00:07:38:00 - 00:07:41:01

Jaelon:

rather than just like, Oh no, I don't really want to learn.

00:07:41:03 - 00:07:46:16

Jaelon:

I feel like you should learn about things that you don't really know about, to be able to

00:07:46:18 - 00:07:48:18

just just accommodate more with the world.

De'An:

Yeah, absolutely.

De'An:

I was thinking about,

00:07:53:06 - 00:07:55:17

De'An:

you know, our interview coming up, and I was thinking about

00:07:55:17 - 00:08:00:08

De'An:

how the world, the planet is a system, right?

00:08:00:10 - 00:08:05:17

De'An:

And the system stays in balance with diversity, biodiversity, right.

De'An:

Because if we kill off certain plants or we kill off certain animals or certain systems, then everything gets out of whack.

It's kind of the same thing with humans, right?

Think about if we didn't have diversity,

think about if we didn't have that, we would be way out of balance.

Jaelon: We would.

00:08:22:14 - 00:08:25:19

Jaelon:

Yeah, it would be like a big step backwards.

De'An: Right?

00:08:25:19 - 00:08:27:00

De'An: Right.

00:08:27:00 - 00:08:30:00

De'An:

So I appreciate those students who want to learn more

De'An:

that are not necessarily a part of the community, but they want to learn more and support the community.

Do you teach it like every semester?

00:08:35:20 - 00:08:39:01

De'An:

It's taught every semester I believe, even in the summer.

I didn't teach it this semester.

De'An:

I did teach it the last couple of semesters.

Jaelon:

- I would have took it. 00:08:43:22 - 00:08:44:20 Jaelon: I would of took it if, 00:08:44:20 - 00:08:47:14 Jaelon: if you were teaching. De'An: You know, everybody who teaches it, 00:08:47:14 - 00:08:51:10 De'An: we make sure that they are really good at that topic. 00:08:51:12 - 00:08:55:00 Jaelon: Yes ma'am. Yeah, That's how it's supposed to be. De'An: -Yes. 00:08:55:02 - 00:08:58:03 Jaelon: Um, how do you think societal attitudes and policies 00:08:58:03 - 00:09:01:12 Jaelon: impact the mental health and wellbeing of LGBTQ+ individuals? 00:09:01:13 - 00:09:03:07 De'An: Oh, my gosh. 00:09:03:07 - 00:09:05:17 De'An: You know, 00:09:05:17 - 00:09:07:17 De'An: one of the things that a lot of people don't 00:09:07:17 - 00:09:11:14 De'An:

understand is structural stigma

00:09:11:16 - 00:09:14:06

De'An:

or structural discrimination.

00:09:14:06 - 00:09:17:09

De'An:

And what that means is, for example,

00:09:17:09 - 00:09:21:23

De'An:

before 2015,

when we had equal before we had equal rights, right?

De'An:

There were some studies done at some clinics

00:09:25:22 - 00:09:30:08

De'An:

up north, I believe it was Massachusetts, maybe Boston, I'm sorry, I can't remember.

00:09:30:08 - 00:09:35:09

De'An:

But the Gay Men's Health Crisis Clinic, a lot of clinics that served gay men

00:09:35:11 - 00:09:39:21

De'An:

and they took the medical records, you know, big medical records.

00:09:39:21 - 00:09:41:11

De'An:

The anon, it was all anonymous.

00:09:41:11 - 00:09:44:17

De'An:

They looked at how much

00:09:44:19 - 00:09:48:10

De'An:

in certain states where they have

00:09:48:12 - 00:09:52:13

De'An:

positive policies for LGBTQ folks,

00:09:52:15 - 00:09:56:16

De'An:

you know, less discrimination and that kind of thing, more open.

00:09:56:18 - 00:09:59:12

De'An:

They looked at the rates of depression

00:09:59:12 - 00:10:03:18

De'An:

and anxiety and mental health reasons that they were visiting the doctor

00:10:03:20 - 00:10:08:14

De'An:

and their rates were lower than in other areas.

00:10:08:16 - 00:10:12:13

De'An:

So in other words, people who live in states

00:10:12:17 - 00:10:17:03

De'An:

where there is more structural laws against who they are, so to speak,

00:10:17:03 - 00:10:21:12

De'An:

or discrimination have higher rates of mental health issues.

De'An:

And we can look at that and we can see that through large

De'An:

databases of medical records access.

Jaelon:

Wow. Yeah. Wow.

00:10:31:11 - 00:10:34:18

Jaelon:

And I actually think that makes a lot of sense

00:10:34:18 - 00:10:38:20

Jaelon:

because it kind of is kind of like, um, like a barrier.

00:10:38:22 - 00:10:42:03

De'An:

It's a huge barrier. It's a huge barrier because think about it.

00:10:42:04 - 00:10:50:08

De'An:

So if you're a young person and you have discovered that you are part of this community,

00:10:50:10 - 00:10:54:01

De'An:

but you get messages from your leadership

00:10:54:01 - 00:10:59:02

De'An:

in your state or your schools or your community

00:10:59:04 - 00:11:05:20

De'An:

that say you're not okay, and there's really something very wrong about you

00:11:05:22 - 00:11:07:21

De'An:

that gets internalized.

00:11:07:21 - 00:11:11:16

De'An:

And that's a powerful message to be internalized

00:11:11:18 - 00:11:16:08

De'An:

and leads to, you know, issues of depression and

00:11:16:10 - 00:11:23:01

De'An:

stigmatizing experiences that they internalize and anxiety.

De'An:

That's why the more we can be advocates

00:11:26:15 - 00:11:30:20

De'An:

for, the more we can speak positive of,

00:11:30:22 - 00:11:33:18

De'An:

you know, LGBTQ folks, the better off

00:11:33:18 - 00:11:37:11

De'An:

everybody is.

Jaelon:

-Yep.

00:11:37:13 - 00:11:40:17

Jaelon:

And that is very important to be able to advocate.

De'An:

Mm hmm.

00:11:41:11 - 00:11:45:10

Jaelon:

Because it's like,

you know, if you have someone in power who's not advocating

Jaelon:

it makes it especially because you are in such a big position to make you feel like, Oh, I don't matter.

Jaelon: Yeah. Or

00:11:53:21 - 00:11:55:23

Jaelon:

I need to find somebody else to advocate for.

De'An: Right.

00:11:56:14 - 00:11:56:23

De'An: Right.

00:11:56:23 - 00:12:03:20

De'An:

It's hard when you feel like you don't have a voice and

00:12:03:22 - 00:12:07:00

De'An:

you feel like your voice is not

00:12:07:02 - 00:12:09:16

De'An:

heard, even if you did speak up.

00:12:09:16 - 00:12:12:22

De'An:

Invisibility is

00:12:13:00 - 00:12:15:21

De'An:

detrimental to people.

00:12:15:21 - 00:12:17:14

Jaelon:

Wow. That's a statement right there.

00:12:17:14 - 00:12:19:04

Jaelon:

That's powerful.

00:12:23:07 - 00:12:23:22

Jaelon:

That's funny.

00:12:23:22 - 00:12:28:13

Jaelon:

That is actually fun that we were on this question about political things.

00:12:28:15 - 00:12:32:08

Jaelon:

How do the ripple effects of, um, political statements

00:12:32:08 - 00:12:35:18

Jaelon:

impact LGBTQ+ individuals and communities?

De'An:

You know, if you take the LGBTQ studies class, you

00:12:40:20 - 00:12:43:20

De'An:

you would learn that,

00:12:43:20 - 00:12:49:03

De'An:

you know, back in the HIV and AIDS crisis at the very beginning,

00:12:49:03 - 00:12:53:04

De'An:

we couldn't get funding and we had thousands and thousands of people,

00:12:53:06 - 00:12:56:12

De'An:

gay men specifically dying.

00:12:56:12 - 00:12:57:17

De'An:

And we didn't know why.

00:12:57:17 - 00:13:01:18

De'An:

And we needed research and I lived through that time

00:13:01:20 - 00:13:05:02

De'An:

and we were fighting for our lives,

00:13:05:04 - 00:13:08:04

De'An:

literally fighting for our lives in our community.

00:13:08:08 - 00:13:10:05

De'An:

Talk about invisibility.

00:13:10:05 - 00:13:12:11

De'An:

And it wasn't until,

00:13:12:11 - 00:13:16:19

De'An:

I believe it was President Reagan who actually used the word aids

00:13:16:21 - 00:13:20:02

De'An:

publicly before we got any funding

00:13:20:04 - 00:13:24:18

De'An:

to really take a look at that and start saving lives

00:13:24:20 - 00:13:26:14

De'An:

and helping people.

00:13:26:14 - 00:13:30:01

De'An:

So really and truly,

00:13:30:03 - 00:13:32:22

De'An:

not only our leadership, but language

00:13:32:22 - 00:13:38:19

De'An:

that our leadership uses, language that anyone uses is very powerful.

00:13:38:21 - 00:13:39:13

Jaelon:

That's true.

00:13:39:13 - 00:13:42:23

Jaelon:

And, um, and I know, like, in today's time, like,

00:13:42:23 - 00:13:48:15

Jaelon:

you know, people are people, people are very they try to be very selective

Jaelon:

with wording and things like that because they don't want to say the wrong thing.

Right.

De'An:

Don't want to say the wrong.

De'An:

Right. Right. Everybody. So they don't say anything.

Jaelon:

Yeah.

00:13:57:11 - 00:14:03:10

Jaelon:

So you know, I, I would

I would like to see like, you know, people

00:14:03:12 - 00:14:07:22 Jaelon: using wording in the more positive way rather than just not saying anything at all. 00:14:07:23 - 00:14:10:07 De'An: Right. It's okay to ask. 00:14:10:07 - 00:14:14:18 De'An: How do you identify What's what? What are your pronouns? 00:14:14:20 - 00:14:17:10 De'An: My pronouns are she, her, that kind of thing. 00:14:17:10 - 00:14:19:12 De'An: It's okay. 00:14:19:12 - 00:14:22:04 De'An:

We have some research that shows that people are more reticent

00:14:22:04 - 00:14:26:02

De'An:

to talk about their money and their income than their pronouns.

00:14:26:06 - 00:14:27:21

De'An:

Believe it or not.

Jaelon: -Really?

00:14:27:21 - 00:14:30:21

Jaelon:

I would have never guessed that.

00:14:30:23 - 00:14:32:11

De'An: -Yeah. Jaelon: I would have never guessed that.

00:14:32:11 - 00:14:36:16

Jaelon:

And I actually learned more more about

00:14:36:18 - 00:14:38:22

Jaelon:

asking for people's pronouns

00:14:38:22 - 00:14:41:14

Jaelon:

being here at the School of Social Work.

00:14:41:14 - 00:14:45:15

De'An:

-Oh, that makes me happy.

Jaelon:

You know, because before

00:14:45:17 - 00:14:48:15

Jaelon:

I, I didn't, I didn't think to ask.

Jaelon:

It was never on my head to ask, Hey, what are your pronouns?

and has to learn that journey

De'An:

We're all in it together, right?

Jaelon: -Exactly.

Jaelon:

Yeah, I'll be elated the day we all move is one, Right?

Jaelon:

That. That right. That'll be the day.

And respect the differences not just is not we don't want to not see anything different.

It just changes the way the world's perspective.

It enriches our own individual lives as well.

Jaelon:

-Yes.

00:17:22:17 - 00:17:26:16

Jaelon:

You talked a little bit about

00:17:26:18 - 00:17:30:05

Jaelon:

your research with, um, smoking,

00:17:30:07 - 00:17:33:20

Jaelon:

um, and members of the LGBTQ community.

00:17:35:16 - 00:17:38:06

Jaelon:

What are some factors

00:17:38:06 - 00:17:41:13

Jaelon:

that contribute to the higher smoking rates?

00:17:41:15 - 00:17:46:05

De'An:

Well.

one of the leading theories is the minority stress theory,

00:17:46:05 - 00:17:51:07

De'An:

and we don't exactly know 100% what contributes to this,

00:17:51:07 - 00:17:54:14

De'An:

but that's one of the leading theories as what I was kind of trying to figure out.

00:17:54:14 - 00:17:55:21

De'An: Right

00:17:55:21 - 00:17:58:21

De'An:

in my in my research for my dissertation

00:17:58:23 - 00:18:01:07

De'An:

is why do we smoke more?

00:18:01:07 - 00:18:05:08

De'An:

Um, you know, there's a it's, it's pretty complex.

00:18:05:10 - 00:18:09:00

De'An:

I, I actually was an ex-smoker and,

00:18:09:02 - 00:18:12:09

De'An:

you know, came out really early as a lesbian and

00:18:12:11 - 00:18:15:21

De'An:

back it back then, smoking was more acceptable.

00:18:15:23 - 00:18:18:17

De'An:

Started becoming more stigmatized.

00:18:18:17 - 00:18:21:17

De'An:

But even women

00:18:21:22 - 00:18:25:08

De'An:

who identify as lesbian assigned female at birth even smoke

00:18:25:08 - 00:18:33:05

De'An:

more than men or gay men, men assigned male at birth.

00:18:33:06 - 00:18:35:20

De'An:

We smoke longer

00:18:35:20 - 00:18:40:21

De'An:

and we just have the higher rates and it it affects everything, right?

00:18:40:21 - 00:18:42:03

De'An:

Smoking affects everything.

00:18:42:03 - 00:18:46:22

De'An:

I think that minority stress theory has to do with the structural stigma,

00:18:47:00 - 00:18:51:05

De'An:

the discrimination, all of those kinds of things, vicarious trauma

00:18:51:05 - 00:18:54:07

De'An:

that we hear through, you know, the media and things like that.

00:18:54:13 - 00:18:55:16

De'An:

That's one thing.

00:18:55:16 - 00:18:58:08

De'An:

Another reason might be,

00:18:58:08 - 00:19:00:09

De'An:

um, like a rebel

00:19:00:09 - 00:19:04:13

De'An:

sort of identity, this outlaw identity kind of thing.

De'An:

Because, you know,

think about smoking is, is really a little bit stigmatized.

De'An:

And so some people go to the opposite instead of sort of hiding it,

they become this sort of outlaw kind of person, which was me, I have to admit,

I was that person.

De'An:

But, you know,

I learned a lot doing that, doing that research.

De'An:

And I learned that

00:19:28:07 - 00:19:31:19

De'An:

women assigned female at birth,

00:19:31:21 - 00:19:35:01

De'An:

people assigned female at birth tend to relapse

00:19:35:01 - 00:19:39:05

De'An:

for different reasons, and smoking then other people.

De'An:

And it's just fascinating. It's really fascinating.

There's a there's a lot of reasons, but we really think it's about the stress.

Right. The stress of living.

Jaelon:

And I know it can be stressful.

I mean, you said you said it's a very rebel mindset.

In my head,

I just picture like a guy like with the leather jacket.

De'An:

And honestly,

a lot of the tobacco companies

00:20:37:20 - 00:20:40:21

De'An:

and liquor companies will target certain populations,

00:20:40:21 - 00:20:45:23

De'An:

and the queer community

is one of the target populations as well.

De'An:

They were one of the first the smoking corporations were

00:20:49:06 - 00:20:52:06

De'An:

one of the were the first

00:20:52:06 - 00:20:55:12

De'An:

corporate like, you know, big corporate companies

00:20:55:14 - 00:21:01:18

De'An:

that funded HIV, AIDS and LGBTQ rights movements back in the day.

00:21:02:00 - 00:21:04:03

De'An:

And they did that on purpose.

00:21:04:03 - 00:21:05:07

De'An:

They did that on purpose.

00:21:05:07 - 00:21:09:05

De'An:

They were saying, you know, smoking back when they were trying to ban smoking from buildings,

00:21:09:07 - 00:21:10:23

De'An:

You're too young to remember this.

00:21:10:23 - 00:21:12:14

De'An:

I'm sure, like used to.

00:21:12:14 - 00:21:15:20

We could smoke in a room anywhere in a building. Right.

00:21:16:02 - 00:21:19:19

De'An:

And so the tobacco companies were sort of strategically trying

00:21:19:19 - 00:21:24:00

De'An:

to align themselves with our groups, our populations,

00:21:24:02 - 00:21:26:23

De'An:

saying it was a choice to smoke.

00:21:26:23 - 00:21:32:09

De'An:

And so LGBT being LGBTQ was a choice as well, is what they were trying to piggyback on.

00:21:32:09 - 00:21:34:07

De'An:

Of course, we know that's not necessarily true.

00:21:34:07 - 00:21:37:17

De'An:

We have a lot of research that demonstrates the opposite, but that's

00:21:37:17 - 00:21:42:08

De'An:

they were the first ones that recognized the queer community.

00:21:42:10 - 00:21:48:01

De'An:

And when you are invisible and you are recognized by a huge corporation,

00:21:48:03 - 00:21:51:13

De'An:

you tend to be loyal as a group.

00:21:51:15 - 00:21:57:00

De'An:

And the same thing with liquor companies and, you know, beer companies and those kinds of things.

00:21:57:00 - 00:22:00:03

De'An:

So they target and then people are loyal.

00:22:00:03 - 00:22:02:06

De'An:

And plus we have stress on top of that.

00:22:02:06 - 00:22:04:09

De'An:

And you've got that outlaw identity.

00:22:04:09 - 00:22:06:21

De'An:

The same thing, right? Yes.

00:22:06:21 - 00:22:10:04

De'An:

So lots of reasons.

Jaelon:

-Wow.

00:22:10:06 - 00:22:12:13

Jaelon:

That's that is true.

00:22:12:13 - 00:22:18:21

Jaelon:

Um, just looking at it and just I never I never realized that

00:22:18:23 - 00:22:22:17

Jaelon:

it's that's how that's how most companies get people in.

00:22:22:22 - 00:22:24:10

De'An:

Yeah, exactly.

00:22:24:10 - 00:22:26:05

Jaelon:

They Oh, my goodness.

00:22:26:05 - 00:22:30:09

Jaelon:

I just, I, you know, I know they, yeah, it did.

00:22:30:09 - 00:22:35:16

Jaelon:

Because it's like, you know, I know like they, they cater to, to different people and,

00:22:35:18 - 00:22:38:14

Jaelon:

and just different groups of people.

00:22:38:14 - 00:22:41:14

Jaelon:

But I never knew was that specific to where

Jaelon:

like even the fact of

targeting people who feel invisible

00:22:47:06 - 00:22:51:17

Jaelon:

and making you seem invisible just to get just to get your product out.

De'An:

-Yes. To get your product out and to politically motivate you to go vote in their favor.

00:22:57:22 - 00:23:00:23

Jaelon:

-Wow.

De'An:

That's what was happening in California back in the day.

00:23:01:03 - 00:23:02:13

De'An:

Absolutely.

00:23:02:13 - 00:23:04:14

Jaelon:

I didn't think about it that deep at all.

00:23:04:14 - 00:23:08:19

Jaelon:

Not to the voting aspect.

00:23:08:21 - 00:23:14:03

Jaelon:

What, if you can,

00:23:14:05 - 00:23:16:22

Jaelon:

what is the most impactful moment of

00:23:16:22 - 00:23:21:02

Jaelon:

in your work dealing with a client with mental health challenges?

00:23:21:05 - 00:23:25:02

De'An:

Yeah, well,

00:23:25:04 - 00:23:26:04

De'An:

there are so many.

00:23:26:04 - 00:23:30:04

De'An:

You know,

I've done a lot of different jobs and mostly in mental health

00:23:30:04 - 00:23:36:17

De'An:

and treatment of people who misuse substances and

00:23:36:19 - 00:23:37:17

De'An:

it's hard work.

00:23:37:17 - 00:23:41:01

I got to tell you, Jaelon, it's really hard work.

00:23:41:01 - 00:23:44:12

De'An:

So you kind of have to when you have those moments, you really have to hang on to them.

00:23:44:12 - 00:23:47:13

De'An:

So one of the moments that I hang on to is

00:23:47:13 - 00:23:50:13

De'An:

I was on campus at

00:23:50:16 - 00:23:56:18

De'An:

Texas Woman's University finishing up something for one of my classes and I was walking across campus.

De'An:

They had a lot of construction going on.

00:23:58:19 - 00:24:01:04

De'An:

And there was a gentleman I could tell out of the corner of my eye.

00:24:01:04 - 00:24:03:08

De'An:

He was trying to kind of get my attention.

00:24:03:08 - 00:24:06:20

De'An:

I think I just, you know, kept walking.

00:24:06:22 - 00:24:10:21

De'An:

And finally he came up to me hesitantly and he said, Ms. De'An?

De'An:

And I said, Yes?

00:24:13:09 - 00:24:19:14

De'An:

And he said, I just want to thank you.

De'An:

He was he said, I have a family now and I have a job

De'An:

and I am back on my own two feet.

De'An:

Thank you for the program that you were a part of.

De'An:

It's because of that program that I'm here and that my family is good and I'm back in with my family

00:24:37:13 - 00:24:42:14

De'An:

and that those things,

those kinds of stories are why we do this.

De'An:

You know, we're not just touching one person, but we're touching

00:24:46:20 - 00:24:51:17

De'An:

whole families and generations.

Jaelon:

-See, that's always that's always great to hear.

00:24:51:18 - 00:24:53:17

Jaelon:

And you actually answer my next question.

00:24:53:17 - 00:24:59:02

Jaelon:

I was going to ask you, you know, how do these how do these like positive outcomes

00:24:59:04 - 00:25:03:23

Jaelon:

and like these personal stories and everything like contribute to the positive outcomes?

Jaelon:

But yeah, I know that's rewarding.

00:25:06:09 - 00:25:06:20

De'An:

-It is.

00:25:06:20 - 00:25:12:17

Jaelon:

I know that is so rewarding.

De'An:

-You know, we have such passion as we started out talking about, social workers

00:25:12:17 - 00:25:16:08

De'An:

have such passion, and our passion can burn us out

00:25:16:09 - 00:25:21:14

De'An:

if we don't harness it and use it and take care of ourselves.

00:25:21:16 - 00:25:27:04

De'An:

And I think one of the ways to do that is to remember

00:25:27:06 - 00:25:29:05

De'An:

the stories

00:25:29:05 - 00:25:32:11

De'An:

of impact that we make all the time.

00:25:32:11 - 00:25:39:01

And we have to also trust that we make that impact even when people don't tell us

00:25:39:03 - 00:25:44:13

De'An:

because we can recognize when people have made impacts on us. Yes.

00:25:46:11 - 00:25:49:15

Jaelon:

That's those impacts.

00:25:49:15 - 00:25:52:15

Jaelon:

Oh, because I listen to

00:25:52:17 - 00:25:58:02

Jaelon:

like whenever anybody comes in here for an episode, I love to hear about the impact they made because it just,

00:25:58:03 - 00:26:00:17

Jaelon:

I don't know, it warms my heart just to see like,

00:26:00:17 - 00:26:03:16

Jaelon:

you know, y'all do so much in the field.

00:26:03:16 - 00:26:07:00

Jaelon:

And I know like the best

Jaelon:

reward is seeing the reaction or the outcome that comes with it.

De'An:

It is the best reward, and they're few and far between.

But you got to hang on to them because they're there and

De'An:

it keeps you going.

De'An:

It just keeps you going.

00:26:28:03 - 00:26:31:01

Jaelon:

Can you suggest

00:26:31:01 - 00:26:33:10

Jaelon:

any specific resources or avenues

00:26:33:10 - 00:26:36:10

Jaelon:

for our listeners to get involved?

00:26:36:12 - 00:26:39:11

De'An:

I think that everybody, you know,

00:26:39:11 - 00:26:42:03

De'An:

we have such a diverse campus and people from all over

00:26:42:03 - 00:26:45:23

De'An:

and there's always community events.

00:26:45:23 - 00:26:50:04

De'An:

You know, Google is your friend, right?

00:26:50:06 - 00:26:53:00

De'An:

You know, get involved, just go to a pride parade,

you know, and talk to people and observe

and look up the calendar events and things like that.

There's lots of ways to find organizations
