the nation for graduate students seeking advanced degrees according to the [2016 U. S. News and World Report](#).

The [University of Texas at Arlington](#) (UTA) School of Social Work ranked No. 38 on the list of best social work graduate programs in the nation, a six point increase from last year. This latest ranking is a testament of the School of Social Work's growth and influence nationally and abroad.

In 2015, [GraduatePrograms.com](#) named the School of Social Work No. 10 on the list of the Top 25 Social Work Schools based on student ratings and reviews. In July of the same year, [Social Work Degree Guide.com](#) ranked UTA No. 12 on its list of the top 25 online Master of Social Work programs.

UTA Social Work research interdisciplinary partners receive recognition for new wireless device to measure anger, help prevent domestic violence

[Dr. Anne Nordberg](#), social work assistant professor and research associate of the [Center for African American Studies](#), and [Dr. Peter Lehmann](#), social work professor, represent an interdisciplinary partnership to combat domestic violence. The partnership includes the [School of Social Work](#), [the College of Engineering](#), the [College of Education](#) and the [College of Science](#) at [UTA](#).

The research team built a wireless wearable device that is embedded into a hat that identifies brain signals related to anger. A person who is becoming angry receives an alerting signal from their smart phone or wrist watch to remind them to practice anger-management techniques learned in therapy sessions. The device creates a systematic method for helping individuals control anger responses.

The study includes a sample of 40 male student volunteers who will be examined to explore the electro cortical and electrical activity that takes place in the cerebral cortex and cardiovascular systems during anger and happiness stimuli.

"We hope that this will lay the groundwork for follow-up studies in pursuit of a way to detect and alert people that they are about to become angry," said Dr. Anne Nordberg.

Anh Phuong Nguyen, social work doctoral student, and Cecilia Mengo, Ph.D. 2016, were selected to assist with the study. The study has the potential to help individuals better understand human behavior as it relates to emotions, as well as develop recommendations and interventions for research, particularly intimate partner violence.

"Not only does this project and technology help offenders learn more about their own behavior when it comes to emotion, but it could help the people around them – their children, their spouses, their partners – potentially warning them," Nordberg said.

UTA testimonial project gives voice to victims, witnesses of police violence

A [University of Texas at Arlington School of Social Work](#) researcher has launched The Black Voice Matters, a testimonial project highlighting the experiences of black people and their encounters with police.

The project comes nearly three years after the creation of The Black Lives Matter movement, which has brought international attention to violence toward black people due to police action or while in police custody. The movement also renewed a decades-long discussion about racial inequalities in the U.S. criminal justice system.

According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics, 13 percent of U.S. residents ages 16 to 17 and 24.9 percent of youth aged 18-24 years had contact with police in 2008.

“Teenagers and young adults are the most watched group of people in the United States, yet the experiences of black youth during encounters with police are very limited in research,” said [Dr. Anne Nordberg](#), assistant professor in UTA’s School of Social Work, a research associate in the UTA [Center for African American Studies](#) (CAAS) and principal investigator for the project. “Through our project, we want to give UTA students and community members a platform to anonymously voice the impact of contemporary acts of violence in their lives.”

Nordberg said The Black Voices Matter project was motivated, in part, by the death of Michael Brown, an unarmed black teenager who was shot and killed Aug. 9, 2014 by Darren Wilson, a white police officer in Ferguson, Missouri. The shooting prompted protests, fires, violence and looting. On Nov. 24, 2014, a grand jury decided not to indict Officer Wilson, and the announcement set off another wave of protests. Last month, the Justice Department called on Ferguson to overhaul its criminal justice system.

The Black Voice Matters research project was introduced last April during the CAAS Power Hour lecture series led by [Dr. Schnavia Hatcher](#), CAAS director and associate professor of social work.

“People who offer their testimonies will help our research team increase and amplify voices of youth in research literature and archive stories for education, research and activism,” Hatcher said. “Eventually, those stories will be publicly available on a dedicated website.”

The first people to be interviewed for the project were Nordberg’s former students. So far, people from the Texas cities of Dallas, Fort Worth, and Houston, and the state of Arkansas have expressed interest in The Black Voices Matter and contributed their stories. Mark Stevens, BSW student and social work research assistant, has been crucial to recruitment efforts. The interviews are professionally transcribed, and Nordberg will present preliminary findings at the annual meeting of the National Organization of Forensic Social Work this summer.

Scott Ryan, dean of the [School of Social Work](#), said projects like this help to bring about better understanding of societal concerns. He said the research also aligns with studies of health and the human condition, a core principle of UTA’s [Strategic Plan 2020: Bold Solutions | Global Impact](#).



Small also has been named Fulbright Scholar, a program sponsored by the U.S. State Department that offers faculty, administrators and professionals residing in the United States grants to lecture, teach and conduct research in a variety of academic and professional fields, as well as participate in seminars.

Small will use his grant to support epidemiologic research on women's health literacy and sexual behavior among unmarried women in Sierra Leone in West Africa from September 2016 to June 2017.

Small's grant will assist with the funding of his research project called "*Understanding Cultural Norms, Health Practices and HIV Knowledge Among Young Adult Women in Sierra Leone*." The study's objectives are to examine health literacy among women in Sierra Leone during premarital and preconception stages, investigate their knowledge of domestic violence and sexually transmitted diseases and identify sources of health information impacting literacy.



Graduates from the UTA [School of Social Work](#) move forward to accomplish great things and make a positive difference in the lives of others in social work and research nationally and abroad.


